Our 2023 Faith Filled Financial Commitment Campaign Begins

Oktoberfest marks the start of our Faith Filled Financial Commitment Campaign for 2023. I hope you have your tickets and are ready to attend on Friday, October 7, start-

ing at 5:30 p.m. in Harvard Hall. There's no charge. (Deadline for reservations was September 29. Sorry, no tickets available at the door.)

Raising money to fund the operations of our cathedral is an important ministry of the cathedral, just like our other ministries — youth, music, outreach, worship, formation, pastoral care, and so much more.

Last year, we surpassed our Faith Filled Financial Commitment goal. We hope to repeat that success by exceeding this year's

goal of \$900,000. This represents an increase of 3.2 percent over the current year. We know you have felt the pinch of inflation at the grocery store and the gas pump.

So has the Cathedral.

Last year's theme was "Every Perfect Gift." This year we celebrate the return to being together in person with our theme "ABC: Abundance, Blessing, Commitment."

You will receive your Faith Filled Financial Commitment mailing the week of October 10. It will include graphic information

on how our budget allocates your pledge dollars. It will include a Commitment Card, which you can mail back to the Cathedral, place in the offering plate, or drop off at the office. An even easier way is to use the online pledge link on our web page at www.spcathedral.org/give-abc.

We urge you to make your commitment by Ingathering Sunday, November 6. (It will save us — and you — a lot of follow-up phone calls.) Then mark your calendar for our Thanks-a-Brunch on Sunday, November 13, after the 10:15 a.m. service, when we'll gather for this festive complimentary meal, fellowship and fun, and a chance to celebrate our many blessings of time, talent, and treasure. Bad Things, Good People, and God: Confronting the Ultimate Question Episcopal Youth Community 5-7 p.m. October 9, 16, and 23

For three Sundays, our EYC (grades 6-12) will ask why bad things happen to good

people and will look for answers to this big question of faith. This is not a book study; it's a multi-part discussion inspired by *Bad Things, Good People, and God: A Guide for Teens*. Author Bryan Bliss frames the discussion this way:

"Just because there isn't an easy answer (any answer?) to the problem of evil – why bad things happen – doesn't mean we need to live in a state of constant anxiety or dread. 


Evensong for St. James



Book Study, Painting Workshop Will Explore Art, Beauty, Faith

Canon Ethan Cole will lead a book group via Zoom this month that culminates in a live painting workshop.

Art and Faith by Makoto Fujimura reflects on the role of art and beauty in the Christian vocation of engaging the world and transforming culture. He writes, "Art making, to me, is a discipline of awareness, prayer, and praise. Imagination gives us wings to create, but it is through Christ's tears and the invitation to the feast of God that we can be partakers of the New Creation."

After we read this book together and reflect on creativity as a spiritual principle and integral part of our faith, local artist Bruce Kotchey will lead us in a one-day painting workshop, open to participants of

Gift Cards Give an Extra Boost to Campbell Park Teachers



Book Club Reschedules Discussion of September Choice: Habemus Episcopa? Is a Female Roman Bishop Possible?



St. Peter's Book Club canceled its September meeting because of Hurricane Ian. They'll discuss their September book choice at their next meeting, at 6:30 p.m. on October 25 in the Chapter Room.

That book is *The Mystery of Julia Episcopa: A Tale of Ancient and Modern Rome* (The Vatican Chronicles, Book 1), by Diane Cummings and John Rigoli (295 pages). Linda Earle is the presenter.

Two contemporary classical archaeologists are tasked with advising the pope on the historical legacy of women in the early Christian period. They find an ancient parchment in the Vatican archives that suggests a woman may once have been a Roman Catholic bishop. They face pressure from a venomous Vatican power structure, but silence would betray the teachings of this first-century Roman noblewoman who gave her life for the teachings of Jesus.

Family Promise Is Back, Working with Homeless Clients

At long last, there is wonderful news: Family Promise has opened its doors and is serving our homeless clients.

Fourteen families have walked through our doors and we successfully fulfilled their immediate needs in connecting with community resources and in preventing homelessness.

We have prevented two families from succumbing to homelessness since opening day. It is certainly more advantageous to keep children in their homes by prevention than to rehouse them once they are homeless.

We are still working hard on opening our shelter operations on October 2, one month earlier than expected. This is an incredible feat! The Congregational Care Committee has been working hard in getting out the word and speaking to congregations to get them involved.

Services to clients have been on hold since late 2018 while the board worked toward financial stability and leadership development and dealt with the limitations imposed by the pandemic.

What Is Family Promise?

Family Promise of Pinellas County is part of a national nonprofit organization serving homeless children and their parents. They are housed at participating churches, moving from church to church each week.

Four times a year they receive their meals and lodging for a week at Palm Lake Christian Church, with St. Peter's support. They spend days at the Day Center at Central Christian Church, 6201 22nd Ave. N, where they seek jobs, social services, and permanent housing.

These are excerpts from Presiding Bishop Michael Curry's homily at a service September 21 at the National Cathedral honoring Queen Elizabeth II, who died September 8.

We have assembled in this sacred place to give God thanks for the life of

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, to give God thanks for a life that was given to service of others, to cause greater than self. We give God thanks that one such as her did walk among us.

Her Majesty in 1953, the year I was born, vowed that she would dedicate her life to the service of her people, and indeed, of humanity. And you know what? She kept her word. She kept her word. We are here to give God thanks that it is possible to serve and to keep your word.

As the Archbishop of Canterbury said at [Westminster] Abbey the other day, "She served out of her religious faith. She served and dedicated her life to God and God's service, seeking to follow in the footsteps of Jesus of Nazareth and His way of love as her way of life."

Dear friends, the God who loves Her Majesty, and receives her into the arms of that love, created each one of us out of that fountain of love. And we are at our best when we live in that love.
