Engineer Will Assess Work Needed on Bell Tower

The Chapter continues its work to prepare for repairs to the bell tower and the roof of the Cathedral.

We are hiring a structural engineer, Biller Reinhart Engineering Group of Tampa, to assess the work necessary on the bell tower. The weight of the third story of the tower, added in 1925, is causing the second story to bow outward.

That work, and a new roof on the nave, will be completed before we begin work to restore the carillon bells, which have been inactive since 2015.

Bishop Scharf has reviewed the plan to date. After we receive the structural engineer's proposal, the bishop will be provided a final project description for the diocese's approval.

At its November meeting the Chapter approved the 2024 budget, which

will be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting on January 28.

At the request of Bishop Scharf, Chapter members earlier this fall agreed to extend their terms by one year during this time of transition, so there will be no elections at the meeting.

In this drone image, taken in mid-November, the 1925 extension of the bell tower, directly under the steeple, is weighing down on the original 1899 tower, causing it to bow outward.

* If you give online via Realm, you can check your balance any time by signing into your account on your device or via the Realm Connect app on your cell phone.

Checks need to be received by the Cathedral by December 29 to be posted and considered tax-deductible for 2023. If you pay online, you have until December 31.

If you pay by automatic deduction from your bank account or credit card, please remember to update these accounts before the end of the year. Many of these accounts automatically expire on December 31 and you must re-set them with a new expiration date, e.g., December 31, 2024.

As for the 2024 Faith Filled Financial Commitment Campaign:

As of November 28, we have received 186 pledges. Those commitments total \$690,178 or almost 73% of our goal.

for those dealing with loss of all kinds.

The service is scheduled for the Winter Solstice, the longest night of the year. We recognize that there is darkness in all our lives. Through music, silent meditation, scripture, and healing prayer, we reach out to acknowledge sadness with comfort and quiet remembrance, to reflect on the losses we have

experienced, and to remember together the real reason for the season: The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. God is with us. This is a service of light in the midst of darkness.

This Advent, Tune Out the Noise and Contemplate the Wonder of God's Love

It came without warning this year. On All Hallows' Eve, as I contemplated my unfinished All Saints' Day sermon, I sat down to a quiet dinner and a little bit of ESPN SportsCenter. And then it happened. The

Holiday Concert Will Offer Music of the Baroque

Start the Christmas season at 7 p.m. December 2 at when the Master Chorale's new chamber ensemble, MC Voices, joins St. Pete Baroque in a concert called "Candlelight Baroque," when



they will sing and play music of the season on period instruments at the Cathedral.

This is a first-time outing for MC Voices, and its first time rendering early music with authentic instruments. St. Pete Baroque won an enthusiastic following at its January concert at the Cathedral (and they'll be back on January 21 for another performance). They play the music of the period (1600-1750) on instruments including harpsichord, lute, viola da gamba, viola d'amore, and baroque winds.

A New Christian Year Begins: Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord

The long green season after Pentecost finally came to an end on November 26, the 26th Sunday after Pentecost, a day observed as Christ the King Sunday, when we acknowledge Jesus's messianic kingship and sovereign rule over all creation.

Pentecost this year was May 28 — 50 days after Easter. The season after Pentecost is a time when we observe the ordered life of the church and explore what it means to live daily in faith and observe everyday sacredness.

Now we begin the season of Advent, the four weeks leading up to Christmas.

Advent is a season of preparation for the Light of Christ coming into the world. We move gradually out of darkness, singing the hymns of longing, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," and of hope: "Prepare ye the way of the Lord" and "Sleepers, wake!"

The clergy vestments and altar hangings are blue, the color of hope, expectation, and heaven. It is also the color associated

with Mary, the mother of Jesus, in iconography and art.

On each of the four Sundays we will light a candle on the Advent wreath. Three of the four candles are blue. The candle for the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday (say "GOW-day-tay"), is rose "Gaudete" means "re-

is rose. "Gaudete" means "rejoice," and pink symbolizes the joy that Jesus is almost here.

In the fourth and fifth centuries, Advent was observed for 40 days, often as a time of severe fasting, and was thought of as a "little Lent" without an explicit link to Christmas. In later centuries

the deeply penitential aspect of Advent was set aside and the season was reduced to four weeks with a specific tie to the celebration of Christ's birth.

Starting on December 3 — Advent 1 — and continuing throughout the liturgi-

cal year, we will read from the Gospel of Mark. (In the Christian year that has just ended we've been reading from the Gospel of Matthew.) Mark's was the first canonical Gospel, thought to have been written about

70 A.D. The shortest Gospel, it constantly implores us to "Keep awake! Be alert!" in anticipation of Jesus's imminent return. Mark uses the word "immediately" 40 times in 16 chapters. This gospel contains no birth narrative; it jumps right in with John the Baptizer performing baptisms at the Jordan and recognizing Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah.

Mark's is "the most studied and influential Gospel," says scholar Gary Wills. Its source and audience, he says, are "a persecuted community with internal divisions and conflict."



Our Microgrants Support Hot Showers, Girls' Empowerment, and Much More

In our second round of microgrants to be awarded in 2023, the Caring and Sharing Committee allocated a total of \$2,500 to six of 12 nonprofit applicants seeking assistants. The recipients are:

* \$500 to Mrbubblez, which provides mobile hot showers, hygiene kits, and clean clothes to the homeless and those at risk of becoming homeless in the Tampa Bay area. Mrbubblez partners with Trinity Café and Metropolitan Ministries in this work. (http://mrbubblezshowers4thehomless. org)

* \$200 to the Jill Kelley Foundation, Heart 4 the Homeless. This will purchase a Zoom membership to allow tutors to spend more time teaching and instructing homeless children than the 40-minute free Zoom sessions. www.heart4thehomeless.org

* \$500 to Golden Generations, My Sistah's Place, which helps young women, especially those aging out of foster care, by providing stable housing, life skills, academic and career support, and mentorship services. http://www.goldengenerations. org/my-sistahs-place

\$400 to Girls on the Run. This is a physical activity-based, positive youth development program designed to help girls cultivate specific, fundamental life skills. The grant will provide entry fees, snacks, and water for hydration stations for their endof season-Celebration 5K on December 2, which is open to all genders, ages, and abilities. (www.gotrtampa.org)

* \$400 to S.T.O.R.Y. 727. This relatively new group will use the grant to help purchase items to be used for distribution and storage when they distribute food to areas in St. Petersburg where quality food is hard to acquire. (On Facebook: S.T.O.R.Y. 727)

* \$500 to Project Prosper for their work in teaching financial literacy to refugees and immigrants (www.projectprosper.org).

This Is How We Gave Thanks

One of the major Fall outreach projects each year is packing and delivering Thanksgiving dinner bags. This year we donated 46 bags— 35 to families at Campbell Park Elementary and 11 to Florida Resurrection House families. Each bag contained a \$35 gift card for the purchase of meat and other perishable supplies, along with a can of green beans, a can of cranberry sauce, instant potatoes, gravy, and a box of dressing mix (or, depending on where you are from, stuffing). We spent only \$241.69 of the \$250 Action Team Grant provided by Thrivent Financial. Everything else — all the gift cards and non-perishable food items — was donated by Cathedral members.

Abolitionists' Bazaars Helped Create The Modern Idea of Christmas

It's the Christmas shopping season, a time of commercial extravagance we all

take for granted now. But the idea of buying gifts rather than exchanging homemade items developed only in the 1820s and '30s — and is linked to the efforts to abolish slavery in the United States.

Abolitionist organizations and local vigilance committees were always desperate for funds, both to support individual enslaved persons who were escaping to the North with train tickets, lodging, and food; and to achieve the political goal of general emancipation.

Charity fairs, or bazaars, sprang up on both sides of

the Atlantic to raise these necessary funds and to channel the energies of female anti-

slavery activists, Eric Foner writes in *Gateway to Freedom: The Hidden History of the Underground Railroad*.

The fairs were typically held just before Christmas, and "abolitionists helped to establish the practice of a Christmas 'shopping season' when people exchanged presents bought at commercial venues," Foner says.

The bazaars sold dolls, toys, needlework, pies and cakes, pickles and jams, poultry and hams. Gradually abolitionists in England became involved, and the fairs became lucrative extravaganzas "focused"

on selling 'fancy' goods from around the world," including blankets and cushions, silks and lace, perfume, porcelain, jewelry, and works of art. By the end of the 1830s they were the major source of abolitionist fundraising.

Recall that Charles Dickens wrote *A Christmas Carol* in 1843, essentially inventing the modern idea of Christmas with carols, trees, cards, decorations, and exchanges of gifts. The abolitionist bazaars would have fit right in.

So as you shop this Christmas season, know that you are doing so in the spirit of consumer activism: "Buy for the Sake of the Slave" was the slogan of the bazaars. You are supporting the breakdown of gender norms as women exercised their skill as excellent fund-raisers and political activists. And you are carrying on the Dickensian tradition of generosity and seasonal cheer. God bless us, every one!
