# Parish Profile Goes Live; Now We Await Applications for Our Next Dean

Our parish profile was posted on March 25; you can see it at <a href="mailto:spearch.">spearch</a>. We'll also have a few printed copies at the front desk.

The profile, prepared by the Search Committee, describes St. Peter's, reflects the thoughts and wishes of our congregation, and enumerates the gifts and experience we hope for in our next dean.

The publication of the profile marks the beginning of a nominating period during which candidates may submit their paperwork to the Bishop's office. The nominating period ends May 1.

The profile is being advertised on Episcopal News Service, posted on various Episcopal Church sites, and circulated widely around the church.


If you know someone you believe would be a good match for us, here's what to do: Send them the link to the profile and invite them to read it and see if they feel a call to St. Peter's. Then they can send their application materials (specified in the profile) to Canon Richard Norman in the diocesan office.

"We thank our committee members for their outstanding work in conceptualizing, writing, editing, and designing the profile," co-chair Ray McColgan said. "It was a great team effort, and we hope the congregation sees itself in the profile."

Ray added: "We ask everyone to continue praying for the Search Committee and the candidates. God knows who our next dean will be and is preparing that person."

While we wait to receive names of candidates from the Bishop, "we're developing questions and educating ourselves about what the candidates are going to ask us and how to conduct effective interviews," co-chair Judy Stark said. "We know discernment of a new call is a two-way street and we want the process to be prayerful and

thoughtful and informative for us and for the candidates."

You — everyone from children to seniors, men and women — are invited to participate this month in the Love Quilt


Project, which creates handmade quilts for children orphaned by AIDS/HIV in South Africa and those in foster care in this country.

St. Peter's has a close connection to this international project. It was founded in 2011 by Gretchen Ginnerty, the Virginia-based daughter of our longtime member and retired choirmaster Roberta Poellein. During a mission trip to South Africa with her church in Virginia, Gretchen learned about the millions of AIDS orphans in that country.

As a skillful quilter herself (like mother, like daughter), Gretchen began to create handmade quilts for the children. Each

unique quilt wraps the recipient in the warmth and love with which it was created.

What began in a small way has grown into a project that provides not only a quilt for each child, but funds for education for hundreds of children in South Africa and now for children in the U.S. living in foster care. ### Cathedral Will Be Brighter, Bell Tower Will Be Stronger

Better lighting in the Cathedral is on the way.

At its March meeting the Chapter approved a proposal to improve the lighting in the Cathedral. The new system will offer 12 different programmable lighting environments, an improvement

over the limited system we have now. This work should be completed by early summer.

The Chapter received a report from the Biller Reinhart Engineering Group, structural engineers, on proposed repairs to the bell tower. The next step is for the engineers to provide construction documents outlining the work: repair and repoint bricks, replace rotted wood with steel framing, mitigate water intrusion, install new louvered shutters, and install stabilizing rods. The tower is in better shape than first thought, with its interior steel structure intact.

## Our Centennial Banner Is On Display for Our Anniversary Year

Just in time for our 135th anniversary as a worshiping community, we are displaying our Centennial Banner, created in 1989

to celebrate our 100th anniversary. It will stand in St. Mary's Chapel.

The banner features the symbols of St. Peter: the upside-down cross and the keys to the kingdom.

This priceless piece of needle art was worked by Robert Fowler, longtime head of the St. Veronica's Needlepoint Guild. It was given by Dr. Richard Phares in honor of his mother, Lorraine O'Neal Phares. The new brass display stand was an anniversary gift from the St. Veronica's Needlepoint Guild.

This year also marks the 125th anniversary of the completion of our original worship space (1899) and the 55th anniversary of our designation as the Cathedral for the Diocese of Southwest Florida (1969).



### Final Choral Evensong for The Program Year

Our final service of Choral Evensong for the program year, at 5 p.m. April 28, includes the Responses of Bermuda-born contemporary composer Gabriel Jackson and the Service In G of British-

born composer Francis Jackson (no relation).


Gabriel Jackson (b. 1962) is probably best known for his vocal music, and while he cites Michael Tippett and Igor Stravinsky as influences, he is also drawn to soul and R&B.

Francis Jackson (1917-2022) was organist and music director at York Minster for 36 years. His extensive output of sacred and secular music in-

cludes canticles, anthems, hymn tunes (including the widely sung "East Acklam"), organ sonatas and other organ pieces, an organ concerto, a symphony, chamber music, and solo songs.

Create your own pysanky — elaborately decorated eggs — through this batik method of design, adapting ancient traditions

from Ukraine to fit your personal meaning and style. We'll gather for a workshop including lunch starting at 10 a.m. Saturday, April 20, in Harvard Hall.

Workshop leader Johanna Zenobia Krynytzky has been "writing" these eggs since she was taught by her mother and grandmother. This age-old tradition was banned in Ukraine by the USSR (as were Ukrainian language, religion, and other



traditions). Today it thrives, in and out of Ukraine, as a national symbol of resilience and rebirth.



## Reading Tutors Help Third-Graders Create a Brighter Future

Reading sessions are at the halfway mark at Campbell Park Elementary School. Kathy Coughlan and Karen Raihill are two of the coaching volunteers who are there on Thursdays for 40-minute sessions with third-graders working to improve their reading skills.

This is part of Lawyers for Literacy, started 19 years ago by the Fleming Law Group, headed by our senior warden, Lucas Fleming. His firm has organized and underwritten this program since its inception. This year the program has targeted 19 elementary schools for this tutoring help. 
## Get to Know St. Augustine With Canon Williams


## From 15th-Century China, a Woman's Struggle Against Tradition

This month the St. Peter's Book Club will discuss *Lady Tan's Circle of Women*, an historical novel by Lisa See. John Sumner is the presenter.

The novel was inspired by the true story of a woman physician in 15th-century China. Tan Yunxian learns the basics of Chinese

medicine from her grandmother and partners with a midwife-intraining to care for women's illnesses, many of which relate to childbearing.

The two young women are separated when Yunxian is forced into an arranged marriage. How might a woman like Yunxian break free of restrictive traditions, go on to treat women and girls from every level of society, and lead a life of such importance that many of her remedies are still used five centuries later?



## Plan Your Funeral Now, So Your Last Rites Are What You Want

"I wonder what they would have wanted..."
So many times, when we as clergy sit down with the family of someone who has recently died, we find they have no idea what their loved one wanted for a funeral. Rite I or Rite II? Favorite hymns? Who should read the

ite hymns? Who should read the lessons or offer a remembrance? Burial or cremation? Favorite colors for the flowers? What sort of reception?

The recent deaths of several beloved members of this community make these questions all the more pressing.

It is a tremendous gift to our survivors to put our wishes and intentions in writing. Your Stewardship Committee has often held a "Final Affairs Fair" to talk about medical surrogates and directives and wills, trusts, and other financial instruments so that your gifts to the church after you die are

settled. Your Cathedral family is as important as your family of origin.

Now we want to focus specifically on funeral planning. What do you want your

funeral to look like? On Sunday, April 21, starting at 3 p.m., we will hold a workshop in Harvard Hall to walk through the stages of funeral planning as a gesture of pastoral and spiritual support to those for whom those recent deaths of beloved friends have reminded us all of the need to make our own plans now.

We will look at the appropriate scripture passages and hymns (and perhaps sing a few), the choice of a service with or without a celebration of the Eucharist, and the particular aspects of Rite I and Rite II. We will talk about the costs of burial of cremation ashes, flowers, and choir. There are many choices, and the person best

equipped to design the funeral you want is you. For younger folks, this workshop may equip you to start helpful conversations with your parents who have not yet made their plans.

If you want to do some thinking ahead of time, prayers around the time of death begin on Page 462 of the Book of Common Prayer. The Rite for the Reception of the Body is on Page 466, and the Burial of the Dead begins on Page 469. Find these materials online at <a href="The Online Book of Common Prayer">The Online Book of Common Prayer</a> in the section "Pastoral Offices."
